Students are singled out for their grit, perseverance and improvement, and are surprised with a certificate of achievement, a small public ceremony at their schools, and a gift card loaded with cash value. The program is fully funded by the generosity of CIS of Chicago employees and alumni employees.

In 2014, recipients received \$200; in 2015, \$250; in 2016, \$250 and, courtesy of donations from the K.W.O.E. Hope Foundation, mini iPads; and in 2017, \$250 gift cards and a “summer fun” exploration gift bag that included games, tickets to live and filmed theatrical performances, and recommendations for free summer activities. Here are two examples of how students used their awards:

- Westcott eighth-grader Jakayla used her gift card to purchase a new backpack and new shoes for school. And then had money left over to spend on a serious new hairdo to boost her self-confidence.
- Kiara, a 12th-grader from Gage Park High School, purchased the bike she'd be wanting for a very long time. She used the new pair of wheels to get to her summer job and her volunteer activities.
